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SECTION : A PREFACE

Maharaja Purna Chandra Autonomous College constitutes the Cornerstone of Higher Education in the district of Mayurbhanj. It was established in the post independence period i.e., 12th July, 1948, during the rule of popular ministry, with Sri Sarat Chandra Das as the Prime Minister and Maharaja Pratap Chandra Bhanj Deo as the ruling Chief of the State of Mayurbhani. Initially the college was started in MKC High School but subsequently shifted to The Royal Edifice of Maharaja Pratap Chandra Bhanj Deo. That edifice was purchased by Government of Orissa in 1956. The college was located on the bank of river Budha Balanga, purling melodiously, time and again goads and guides the students to shed their inertia and be for ever intellectually on the move like the flow of its waters. In 1948 the college secured affiliation to Utkal University in Intermediate Arts & Science with a sanctioned strength of 112 and 08 respectively. The BA (Pass) class with a sanctioned strength of 48 students was opened in the session 1949-50. The courses offered were English, Oriya, Economics and Mathematics to which History was added in 1958 -59. Honours courses in Economics, Political Science and English were introduced in 1961, 1963 and 1965 respectively. Oriya Honours was started in 1967. Sanskrit Honours was started in 1978-79. The B.Sc. course with Physics, Chemistry and Mathematics as Pass were started in 1960-61 to which Botany and Zoology were added in 1966. Honours Courses in Physics & Chemistry were offered in 1967 & 1968 respectively. Botany & Zoology Honours started in 1972. Affiliation to Commerce stream (Pre-University Level) was made in 1965. To this first year degree in commerce was added in 1966 and B.Com. (Pass) in 1967. Honours in Commerce was introduced in 1974-75.

Provision of Post Graduate Teaching in Commerce and History started from 1979-80 and 1983-84 respectively. Post Graduate teaching in Economics, Philosophy and Chemistry started during the session 1990-91. Post Graduate teaching in Physics, Political Science and Oriya commenced from 1992-93. Subsequently Post Graduate teaching was also introduced in Zoology, Botany and English from 1993-1994. New subjects like Statistics, Geography, Geology, Sociology, Secretarial Practice and Photography were started between 1981-83. Geography as optional subject was introduced at +3 Level in 1992-93. Sociology was introduced in the next session. Several vocational subjects were introduced in 1994-95. These are (a) Sericulture for +3 Science, (b) Communicative English for +3 Arts and (c) Office

Management and Secretarial Practice for +3 Commerce. This continual opening of course offerings has entited many students from outside the State.

When Utkal University was divided into three Universities, the North Orissa University was established in July, 1999. M.P.C. College was affiliated to North Orissa University in July 1999. All the examinations were conducted by the North Orissa University for the session 1999-2000 and 2000-2001. M.P.C. College was conferred with autonomous status by the UGC, New Delhi on 22-09-1999. However real academic autonomy was conferred upon the college during 2001-2002 with an independent Entrance Examination based on selection procedure, independent courses of study and independent examination procedure for +3 Ist Year students and Vth Year PG students. M.P.C. Autonomous College was shifted from the Old Maharaja Palace to its new college campus at Takhatpur during May-June 2001. The college started functioning in the new campus from 8th June 2001. According to the directives of the Department of Higher Education, Govt. of Odisha, M.P.C. Morning College merged with M.P.C. Autonomous College. By the order of Department of Higher Education five PG Departments viz, Botany, Chemistry, Economics, Physics and Zoology were shifted to North Orissa University during July 2004. In exchange the Higher Education Department, Govt. of Orissa approved opening of four Self-financing courses viz., Bio-Chemistry, Industrial Chemistry, Environmental Economics and Microbiology from the session 2005-06. Opening of MBA as SFC under PG Dept. of Commerce was subject to approval of AICTE. Out of four approved SFCs Microbiology (SFC) started during 2006-07 to which, Industrial Chemistry (SFC) during 2012-13, Bio-Chemistry (SFC) started during 2014-15 and Environmental Economics (SFC) during 2015-16.

SFC at U.G. level such as B. Sc. Computer Science (Honours) and B.Com. e-Commerce (Honours) has been functioning in this college since 1998-99 and 2004-05 sessions respectively with intake capacity of 32 seats each per admission batch. Lakhotia Computer Centre(LCC) being sponsored by Higher Education Department, Government of Odisha has been imparting various Computer programmes to both UG & PG students of this college since 2001-02 which ceased down during 2009-10. Five Honours subjects such as Geology, Geography, Hindi, Sociology and Statistics being approved by Higher education Department, Government of Odisha from the academic session 2009-10 have been opened in this college to cater the persistent demand of the students. At present six regular PG Departments viz., Commerce, History, English, Oriya, Political Science and Philosophy are imparting teaching to post graduate students. In addition to regular courses, P.G. SFC courses Viz. Micro Biology,

Industrial Chemistry, Bio Chemistry & Environmental Economics have been functioning in this college.

The curricula of undergraduate and postgraduate classes are in conformity with those provided by the UGC. Eight papers for Honours and 10 Papers for PG students have been prescribed with a view to widening the intellectual horizon of the students and giving them scope to keep abreast of the recent developments in diverse fields. "Environmental Studies" as compulsory subject has been introduced for all the streams at Degree level. 60 Seated M.B.A. and M.C.A. have been approved by AICTE since 2011-12 and enrollment has been made in MCA during 2013-14. Education Honours and Elective have been opened during 2013-14 with approval of Higher Education Department. M.I.L. Santali and Honours in Santali opened during 2014-15. Honours Subject in Anthropology & Psychology opened during 2014-15. BBA & BCA as SFC at U.G. Level started during 2015-16. BCA & MCA have been functioning in PPP mode in Collaboration with NOSCOMS Baripada.

Diploma in Tourism & Hospitality Management under Community College Scheme of UGC has been functioning in this college since 2014-15. Language Laboratory has been functioning under English Department Since 2014-15.

Since the college is located in tribal dominated district of Mayurbhanj where perceptible number of tribal and rural based students are reading there is prospect of Star College / Centre for Excellence subject to approval by UGC office, New Delhi.

Since the college is located in the district of Mayurbhanj having bestowed with Similipal Bio-Sphere reserve there is prospect of research in the field of Environmental Studies. Further archeological survey can be conducted by the PG Department of History in the district of Mayurbhanj.

The current Curriculum design conforming to UGC Module Curriculum and Semester system generates the scope of employability as the present syllabi are at par with all India pattern and promote global competencies among the students. The latest curriculum is based upon Choice Based Credit System of U.G.C. introduced from the current Academic Session 2015-16 which will foster Global competencies among the students and promote the prospects of employment. The present syllabi will unable the students to successful at the National Level competitive Examination .

* Innovation

Introduction of subject matter such as Geography , Geology, Anthropology, Psychology , Micro-Biology , Bio-chemistry , Env. Eco, etc reveal innovation in the curriculum .

* Research

Research Methodology being incorporated in PG Syllabi and Seminar presentation in both UG Honours and PG will enable the students to be engrossed in research work after PG Level. Seminar Paper present6ation / Project work has been made mandatory for UG- VI Semester and PG IV – Semester which will promote Research work of the students at M.Phil and Ph.D. Level . The concerned subject teachers used to guide the student for the preparation of Seminar Paper / Project work .

1.1.5 How does College ensure that the curriculum developed address the needs of the society and have relevance to the regional / national developmental needs?

Introduction of interdisciplinary subjects like Indian Society and culture, Environmental Studies as compulsory subjects in all streams of under graduate courses helps in making the learners aware of their social role. Thrust on extension services primarily focus on dissemination of knowledge, social service and character building. Beside the latest CBCS Syllabus has relevance to the regional / national developmental needs.

The College pursues the guidelines of the regulatory bodies such as University Grants Commission, Board of studies , Academic Council and Executive Committee for restructuring the curriculum . The UGC module curriculum pursued up to $11^{\rm th}$ Five year Plan has national impact . However the latest CBCS Syllabus impact on national forum has not been visualized so far .

The latest CBCS syllabus offers high degree of Academic Flexibility as students of any discipline can opt for other subject included in the Elective Papers. Science being taught to Arts /Science /Commerce students.

b. Enrichment courses

Semester system syllabus introduced in 2007-08 has been revised in 2009-10 and 2013-14 both for UG & PG courses. In the current Academic Session CBCS syllabus of UGC has been introduced for UG courses. In the next Academic Session PG courses based upon CBCS will be introduced.

c. Courses offered in modular form

All courses are offered in modular form. Each paper contains five units and students are required to answer from each module having alternative option within the unit/module only.

d. Credit transfer and accumulation facility

Choice based credit system has been introduced from the Current Academic Session. The results of all Semesters are taken together for the publication of final results at UG/PG level.

e. Lateral and vertical mobility within and across programmes and courses

Environmental Studies is compulsory in all disciplines at UG level Inter-disciplinary Courses such as Biology for Physical Sciences, Mathematics and Statistics for Biological Sciences, Indian Society And Culture for Arts and Commerce students, Economics is a compulsory paper for all Commerce Students.

For the purpose of e- admission wider Publicity is given in the local news papers . For PG admission the College has introduced the practice of submission of documents through Resister Post . The College use to advertise the admission Notice in the Local newspaper .

For UG admission the students are required to submit Common Application Form (CAF) on line to the nearby College having option of the College and Hons. subject in order of priority. The merit list of prepared by the Higher Education Department Centrally on the basis of +2 Marks and the concerned Colleges are required to download the merit list for the purpose of admission. The admission involves verification of original documents and deposit of requisite amount of admission Fees.

For PG admission the admission committee comprising various sub-Committee of the concerned the PG Department prepare the merit list on the basis +3 Hons. Mark.

2.1.3 Does the College have a mechanism to review its admission process and student profiles annually? If yes, what is the outcome of such an analysis and how has it contributed to the improvement of the process?

The Government has the mechanism to review its admission Process and Student profiles annually for undergraduate courses. However, the college reviews its admission process and student profile of PG classes in the admission committee meeting held after the admission process.

- * Outstanding achievers in sports and extracurricular activities: Govt. has envisaged reservation policy for the outstanding achievers in sports and extracurricular activities on the basis of which those students are being enrolled.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 Does the College organize orientation / induction programme for freshers? If yes, give details of the duration of programme, issues covered, experts involved and mechanism for using the feedback in subsequent years.

The College organizes induction programme for freshers after admission into the college. It is a one-day programme. The freshers are enlightened about the glory of the college and the rich Alumni it has produced. Further, they are sensitised about the rules and regulations, facilities available, college discipline, examination patterns and schedules, attendance and other academic matters of the college by the Academic Bursar Administrative Bursar, Controller of Examinations. Librarian, P.E.T and senior faculty members and Resource Persons.

2.2.2 Does the College have a mechanism through which the "differential requirements of student population" are analyzed after admission and before the commencement of classes? If so, how are the key issues identified and addressed?

Differential requirements like Choice of elective/Pass and Honours Subject, Hostel requirement etc. of students population, as furnished in their respective Common Application Form (CAF), are analysed after the admission and before the commencement of classes .These are reviewed by a committee concerned for each requirement for the next course of action. The weaker groups are provided with the permissible financial support, free studentship, lending of books from the library and recommended for scholarships & stipends from different agencies etc. The Honours and elective subjects are given on merit through a process of counselling.

2.2.3 Does the College provide bridge /Remedial /add - on courses? If yes, how are they structured into the time table? Give details of the courses offered, department-wise/faculty-wise?

Yes, the college provides bridge/remedial classes for the weaker students. Remedial coaching classes funded by UGC have been conducted for UG Honours and Elective Students for the period 2009-10 to 2012-13 for the purpose of doubt clearing of noncreamy layer students and improvement of their back papers. However UGC has ceased down the Merged Scheme during 12th Five year plan as prevalent during 11th five year plan.

The Time Table for remedial Coaching class is framed outside the normal class time table. The remedial coaching classes have been organized for all UG (Arts/ Science/ Commerce) classes.

However after the ceased down of remedial coaching class, extra classes being engaged by the staff members for the doubt clearing of the back paper students.

2.2.4 Has the College conducted a study on the incremental academic growth of different categories of students; - student from disadvantaged sections of society, economically disadvantaged, physically challenged and slow learners etc.? If yes, give details on how the study has helped the College to improve the performance of these students.

After the study those category of students are appraised their performance and instructed to attend the extra classes engaged by the concerned subject teacher which helped those students to improve their performance

Through interactive method, the concerned subject teachers identify the advance learners and accordingly provide advanced study materials to cater their needs.

Teaching-Learning Process

2.3.1 How does the College plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan and evaluation blue print, etc.)

The professor-in-charge of Time Table prepares the Time Table in association with associate officers in charge of time table both for UG & PG Courses prior to the Commencement of the new academic session. At present the Academic Calendar of the college is being prepared prior to the re-opening of the college and distributed to the students and teaching staffs.

Lesson Plan and Progress Registers are being maintained department wise/ Semester wise which exhibits the progress of the courses as per Lesson Plan.

The Examination Schedule is prepared by the Controller of Examinations well in advance of the commencement of examination and distributed department wise to the concerned HOD and the students.

However for the last two years, Common Academic Calendar prepared by Higher Education Department, Govt. of Odisha being circulated to all the colleges.

2.3.2 Does the College provide course outlines and course schedules prior to the commencement of the academic session? If yes, how is the effectiveness of the process ensured?

Courses of Studies prepared by concerned Department staff members duly approved by the Board of Studies and Academic Council which authorized the Controller of Examination s to print and circulate the Courses Studies both for UG and PG courses prior to the commencement of the Academic Session.

After the distribution of Courses of Studies to the students, it help them to obtain the details of the course structure and list of reference books and accordingly the students requisition the books from the college Central Library.

2.3.3 What are the courses, which predominantly follow the lecture method? Apart from classroom interactions, what are the other methods of learning experiences provided to students?

Lecture method is followed in some courses at UG& PG level. However, modern teaching aids like audio-visuals, over -head projector, transparencies, slides, and LCD Projector are also used to make learning more student-centric and interactive. Seminars, workshops, group discussions, Project Works and field studies form an integral part of the curriculum at Hons & PG level.

2.3.4 How is 'learning' made more student-centric? Give a list of participatory learning activities adopted by the faculty that contribute to holistic development and improved student learning, besides facilitating life-long learning and knowledge management.

Learning is made more student-centric by giving them topics on seminar papers / project works. They prepare and present seminar topics. They also complete their assigned project work and seminar topics guided by the concerned teacher of the Department. Besides seminar and project work, students are encouraged to participate in Group Discussions, debates, and quiz programmes.

2.3.5 What is the College policy on inviting experts / people of eminence to provide lectures / seminars for students?

The college invites people of eminence to deliver lecture to student and staff & encourages all Departments to invite experts or eminent personalities in their respective fields to address seminars or give extramural lectures. During last academic session, 16 visiting faculties were invited to deliver special/extra moral lecturers in the topic of their expertise.

2.3.6 What are the latest technologies and facilities used by the faculty for effective teaching? Ex: Virtual laboratories, e-Learning, open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

Faculties use White Board, Smart Board, Overhead projectors, LCD Projectors, Projection Boards for teaching purpose. They refer different educational websites and e-journals from Internet for disseminating knowledge to the students. Language Lab. has been set up during last academic session to enhance the communicative skill of the students and promoting their employability in the job market.

Yes. Each of the faculty members is assigned the duty of being a proctor, who acts as a Counsellor/mentor/advisor for a group consisting of 24 students. The proctor looks into the academic, psychological and personal problems of the students allotted to him/her, and advise them accordingly and try to sort out the same. All UG (Arts/ Science/ Commerce) students covered under proctorial system are substantially benefited through the effective guidance of the concerned proctors.

2.3.8 Are there any innovative teaching approaches/methods/ practices adopted/put to use by the faculty during the last four years? If yes, did they improve the learning? What methods were used to evaluate the impact of such practices? What are the efforts made by the institution in giving the faculty due recognition for innovation in teaching?

Participatory and student-centric teaching methods have been introduced with the use of modern technology in addition to the usual black board methods. Students are encouraged to present seminar papers, project reports and participate in group discussions. These have helped to improve the learning process. Impact of such practices are ascertained from the results of each examination. The teachers involved in innovative teaching are rewarded with a good Grade in their PAR by the Principal.

2.3.9 How does the College create a culture of instilling and nurturing creativity and scientific temper among the learners?

Creative writings in the form of poems, short stories, jokes, popular science topics etc. are encouraged by publishing them in the college magazine, departmental wall magazines etc. Scientific temperament is instilled by holding exhibitions, assigning small problems in the form of project work and taking them on study trips to different science laboratories and scientific sites. Observations of World Environmental Day, World Water day, Earth Day, World Aids day instill scientific temper.

Yes Project work is compulsory for all UG 3rd year (Hons.) students. Each faculty member of a Department guides one or more students to complete their project work.

2.3.11 What efforts are made to facilitate the faculty in learning / handling computer-aided teaching/ learning materials? What are the facilities available in the College for such efforts?

Most of the departments have PC/laptops, LCD projectors, overhead projectors, Audio-visual facility etc. Some of the Departments have their own Internet connection. The library has net connectivity. The teachers are encouraged to impart computer-aided teaching. The Computer Programmer, DEO, and other employees with computer knowledge facilitate those who are not well versed with computers and other modern teaching gadgets.

2.3.12 Does the College have a mechanism for evaluation of teachers by the students / alumni? If yes, how is the evaluation used in achieving qualitative improvement in the teaching-learning process?

Yes. Feed backs on teachers' performances are collected from students confidentially at the end of each semester. These are analyzed by the Principal and IQAC. Teachers with deficiencies are informed about areas of concern for future rectification.

2.3.13 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If yes elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

The Institution does not face any challenges in completing the curriculum with the planned time frame and academic calendar as from the inception of academic session, guest faculties are recruited in addition to the existing regular teachers (Department having less than 50% of the sanction strength).

The library resources like Text books, reference books, journals, periodicals and e-resources etc. are referred by the teachers to prepare their lecture notes or to guide in seminar topics/project work. Students also use these to prepare notes for examinations.

- .The Principal verifies the lesson plans & progress register of each department on monthly basis; gives surprise visit to different classes.
- . Head of each Department discusses methods adopted in teaching, progresses made, and student attendance and student performance etc. with other members of the Department.
- . The Principal convenes meetings of Heads of the departments at regular intervals to ascertain completion of course on time, quality teaching methods, improvised class room environment. He/She also takes stock of academic performance of the students of each Department.

The college has taken a number of innovative approaches to achieve academic excellence through improvement of different pillars of the institution like academic and administrative. The academic innovations include establishment of Language laboratory, introduction of ICT tools, use of e-resources, use of Power Point presentation, emphasis on participatory learning method, holding of seminars (inter and intra-departmental), Ds, debates and mock interviews, assigning project works, workshops and exhibitions, introduction of practical in mathematics, making mathematics a compulsory subject for students of Physics Honours and introducing NCC as an Elective/pass subject in 1st year degree classes in all the streams. Women self defence training is given to students in a phased manner from the session 2013-14. In the administrative front, e-administration has been substantially followed. Library has been made semi-automated. Correspondence with the Government is made through e-space. IQAC is monitoring the institutional quality on a regular basis. All academic reforms are done with due approval of the academic council and the EC. The college very often calls for suggestions from eminent personalities in different walks of life for the academic excellence. The innovations are rewarded by increase in the student enrolment, reduction in dropout rates, increase in pass out rates and the rate of entry in to higher studies and success in different competitions held in job market.

II. Examination process:

Examination material management:

- The question papers are received from the printing firm concerned in sealed packets, which bear the name of the subject with its code no., paper, date and sitting of examination.
- Questions for an examination are received in 2 to 3 phases.
- The Question packets are kept in locker by the Controller of

Examinations (COE). The packets are issued to Superintendent/

Deputy Superintendent in a phase-wise manner.

• The blank answer sheets (Main & Additional) are kept in the strong

room and its stock and issue is properly maintained. They are handed over to the invigilators in their respective rooms as per the equirement.

- After the examination is over, the Invigilators take the account of the answer sheets and question papers. The unused answer scripts and question papers along with the accounts statement are returned to the Officials concerned. Then these are handed over to the COE along with a Memo.
- **Logistics:** Supply of drinking water, uninterrupted power supply, and attendant for each room are ensured.

III. Post examination process:

Attendance Capture:- Room wise attendance is thoroughly maintained.

Auto processing: The auto processing is done in the office of the Controller.

Generic result processing: Result is processed confidentially by the office of the Controller.

IV. <u>Certification</u>: Pass out students get their provisional certificates from the college. Original certificates are issued by the affiliating university (Utkal University).

2.5.9 What efforts are made by the College to streamline the operations at the Office of the Controller of Examinations?

One faculty member has been appointed as Controller of Examinations (COE) and three faculty members have been appointed as Deputy Controllers to assist him. The COE holds his/her office independently. All examination related documents are under his/her custody. Adequate number of ministerial staff have also been provided for full time support. Members from teaching staff are assigned the duty of coding of answer scripts and tabulation work. The examination section is equipped with all essential gadgets like computers, inverter, photo copiers, landline telephone connection, air Conditioners etc.

2.5.10 What is the mechanism for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation?

The students are given scope for redressal of their grievances with reference to evaluation. In order to make the evaluation process more transparent, the students are allowed to go through the evaluated answer scripts of the mid-semester examinations. So far as Semester End exams are concerned, they are free to apply for re-addition of marks in one or more than one paper, after depositing the requisite fee in the college counter, within 20 days from the publication of the result. The Controller of Examinations takes necessary steps as per the regulation and the result of reaudition is communicated to the students concerned.

The Principal of the college takes stock of the performance of thestudents of each Department after publication of the results through informal interaction with each and every department. NAAC Peer Team in its report on 5th Feb,2011 recommended for fiiling up the vacancy position in respect of both teaching and non teacing staff of the College. There has been persistent correspondence with Dept. of Higher Education, Govt. of Odisha for filling up the vacancy position on priority basis as the student enrollment of the college has been enhanced to 4565. At present the position of the teaching factuality (Regular, Adhoc and Guest Faculity) has increase to 79 out of the total sanctioned post of 85 i.e. 93% of the teaching post have been filled up. However in respect of non teaching staff at present 66 are serving (63 Regular+ 03 DEO) out of the total sanctioned post of 131 i.e. 50.4% of the non teaching post have been filled up. To carter the exigencies and cumulative work load of the college office (E-Admission , UGC,IQAC, Examination and Library) 03 DEOs have been appointed to streamline the office work. After perceptible enhancement in the teaching staff position and 32 Nos. of Ph.D & 02 Nos of D.Sc and D.Lit holders their has been significant improvement in the quality of teaching.

By holding competitions on debate, GDs, analytical skill ,essay writing, quiz, G.K etc at the college and inter college level; encouraging students to participate in these held at state and national level also.

*Inculcating a value system among students

By arranging extramural lectures in which eminent persons in different walks of life like Gandhian disciples, freedom fighters, sports personalities, Yoga are called to the college to deliver their valuable lectures.

* Promoting use of technology

By use of computers in office, examination and different departments. Admission and salary bills are prepared and submitted to treasury on line. Internet and ICT is often used in teaching. Library has been automated .The work of Wi-Fi facilities is in progress.

* Ouest for excellence

All members of the faculty and other support staff of the college have an instinct to excel and give a concerted effort towards the excellence of the college on all fronts be it academic, extension activity, infrastructural development or ambience of the college.

The joint Expert Committee of UGC visited the college during 23rd and 24th October 2013 and recommended for extension of autonomy of the college with ex-post facto approval for the period 2010-11 and 2011-12 and extension of autonomy for the period 2012-13 to 2018-19. The Core Committee (Planning & Evaluation Committee) of the college meets at regular interval in which Principal is the ex-officio Chairperson. The allocation of the autonomy grant, development grant, AGE grant, Plan Block Grant are made by the core committee with guidelines of UGC.

The college has statutory committees like Executive Committee, Academic Council ,Planning and Evaluation Committee, Board of Studies and Finance Committee. The non-statutory committees of the college are Admission Committee , Examination Committee, Purchase Committee and Library Committee. The Executive Committee is the highest decision making body. The Academic Committee ratifies all academic matters including changes made in syllabi. The Finance Committee passes the annual budget of the college. The Examination Committee takes decision on all exam related matters. There is a Staff Council comprising all faculty members, which meets at regular intervals to deliberate on matters of importance and to advice the principal suitably. All committees work in a co-ordinated manner towards smooth functioning of the college. The principal appoints an Accounts Bursar who keeps vigil on the expenditure side, an Administrative Bursar who reviews the establishment matters, and an Academic Bursar who looks in to the academic progress of the college. Administrative Bursars assist the Principal in smooth functioning of the college office work. OIC UGC and Autonomy assist the Principal in the smooth execution of UGC Grants and compilation of various UGC reports.

 - The teaching staffs of the college are encouraged to attend seminars, workshops, orientation and refresher programmes and to undertake research Projects. The College allows and encourages the non-teaching staffs to undergo accounts training and acquire computer knowledge to enhance their competencies.

The college administration has decentralized the powers. It has great trust and faith on the functionaries at different helms of affairs. The Principal, being the Head of the institution, is responsible for every action taken at various levels and carries out the decision of the Executive Committee and the Finance Committee for effective management of the institution. Major decisions that do not come under the purview of Executive Committee and the Finance Committee are taken in the Staff Council. The IQAC is active in the college. All committees, whether Statutory or non-statutory, meet at regular intervals to discuss different problems and suggest to the principal, the measures to be taken. CCTV Camera have been installed in the college campus out of Plan Block Grant of UGC to safeguard against violence caused by the student mob during college union election. Besides the issues of ragging and embarrassment to women employees of the college can be traced out through CCTV footage. Principal used to review the entire campus through CCTV. Biomatrix attendance system has been introduced in the college office in November 2015 to make the employees vigilant of their duties.

- Women self-defense training is imparted in the post-Nirvaya period. Our college is the nodal center with perceptible number of master trainers for imparting training to girls students of the different colleges.

3. The Context

Changes in curriculum are made at regular intervals and made job-oriented. The UG students are given ample flexibility in taking Elective and Honours subjects. CBCS pattern of syllabus has been introduced. Teaching modules and lesson plans are prepared for the semester pattern examination in order to fulfill the continuous evaluation process. Some of the topics need ICT tools.

4. The Practice

Students are encouraged for Power-Point presentation of seminar topics, to take part in debates; field study and project works. They are also encouraged to participate in outdoor & indoor games, sports, athletic meets. These aspects enhance the academic ambience of the College. A language laboratory has been established for acquiring communication skills through interactive learning. Facility of Internet browsing is also provided to the teachers and students. Most of the faculty members use LCD projectors and other ICT tools to teach the students.

5. Evidence of Success

Sustained efforts made by the faculty has been rewarded by increase in attendance of the students in the class rooms, lowering dropout rates and increase in pass out rate with higher percentage of marks.

All teachers are to be trained in using ICT for preparing teaching aid. Procedural constraints in availing grants from the Govt. or UGC for investment in procuring LCDs, OHPs, Educational CDs, Hardware & Software etc. is a common phenomenon.

- (a) Majority of the students of the Department belong to the District of Mayurbhanj who are poverty Stricken.
- (b) Students from the periphery Colleges being inducted in to the Department with 40 % Cut off Mark.
- (c) Most of the Students have Passed +2 Economics in Odia medium for which to grasp to Subject matter of Economics in English Medium is a herculean Task.
- (d) Students coming from the periphery Colleges are having poor mathematical and statistical background for which it is tedious on their part to grasp the subject matter.
- (e) 10% of the Department students having Back paper in semester Examination are being offered special care through Remedial Coaching Class for the purpose of their doubt clearing and improvement in Back Paper Examination.

Opportunity:-

- (a) 100% Classes of U.G. Hons. and Elective Subjects are being engaged by the Department Staff members.
- (b) 94% of the Hons. students are being successful in the final Semester Examination .
- (c) Latest edition books in Economics are being procured by the College central Library out of U.G.C. Autonomy Grant and each Hons. student being provided at least 04 books in each month.
- (d) P.G., Evn. Eco., (SFC) students are provided 06 books from P.G. Department Seminar Library in each month. For the engagement of 100% Class of P.G. students two Guest Faculty have been appointed by the principal and payment being made out of SFC Account.
- (e) Students of Economics Department have greater scope of employability as the pass out students are being engaged in Academic institutions, Banking, and Administrative and NGOs.

Challenges:-

- (a) As per the circular of Higher Education Department Govt. of Odisha, all the regular staff members of the Department are engaging 25 Classes per week which tend to slacken the scope for intensive research work and quality of teaching.
- (b) The District of Mayurbhanj being Tribal dominated, the Tribal family students belonging to BPL category are being admitted in to the Department who find it tedious to grasp the subject matter of Economics.
- (c) Those students passing +2 Economics in Odia medium find it a herculean task to grasp the subject matter of Economics for which they are having Back Paper in the Semester Examination
- (d) Remedial coaching Classes are being organized out of U.G.C. Fund (Merged scheme) of U.G.C. 11Th five year plan for the purpose of doubt clearing and improvement in Back paper Examination .However those non-creamy layer students deliberately remain absent in the remedial coaching class for which the purpose remains unfulfilled.
- (e) The major concern is that U.G.C. under 12th Five year plan has abolished the Remedial coaching class for which the non-creamy layer students will be deprived of the benefits. However teachers of the Department are undertaking special care for doubt clearing of the Back paper students.

39. Future plans of the department.

Regular P.G. in Economics teaching facilities provided by the Department for the period Feb. 91- May 2004. However regular P.G. Department was shifted to North Orissa University in June 2004. In lieu of regular P.G. Department, Higher Education Department accorded approval for the opening of M.A. Env.Eco. from the Academic Session 2005-06 in SFC mode. The course Fee has been Fixed at Rs. 5000/- per annum. The District of Mayurbhanj being Tribal dominated, the students belonging to BPL category lack affordability for the course Fee as regular course Fee is nominal. Therefore in place of SFC mode Higher Education Department should accord approval for P.G. in in Economics as regular subject for which proposal has been forwarded to Higher Education Department for its necessary approval.

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

The College has an acute shortage of staff in teaching as well as non-teaching. In spite of this, the teachers are managing the entire work of the College in an uninterrupted and excellent way. Specially, the examination Cell of the College is being run satisfactorily by ensuing timely conduction of examinations and declaration of results. Besides, almost all the teachers, despite of so much work, devote their time in writing books, research papers etc.

BACKGROUND OF THE COLLEGE

Maharaja Purna Chandra Autonomous College constitutes the Cornerstone of Higher Education in the district of Mayurbhanj. It was established in the post independence period i.e., in July, 1948, during the rule of popular ministry, with Sri Sarat Chandra Das as the Prime Minister and Maharaja Pratap Chandra Bhanj Deo as the ruling Chief of the State of Mayurbhanj. Initially the college was started in MKC High School but subsequently shifted to royal edifice of Maharaja Pratap Chandra Bhanj Deo. That edifice was purchased by Government of Orissa in 1956. The college was located on the bank of river Budha Balanga, purling melodiously. In 1948 the college secured affiliation to Utkal University in Intermediate Arts & Science with a sanctioned strength of 112 and 80 respectively. The BA (Pass) class with a sanctioned strength of 48 students was opened in the session 1949-50. The courses offered were English, Oriya, Economics and Mathematics to which History was added in 1958 -59. Honours courses in Economics, Political Science and English were introduced in 1961, 1963 and 1965 respectively. Oriya and Philosophy Honours started in 1967. Sanskrit Honours started in 1978-79. The B.Sc. course with Physics, Chemistry and Mathematics as Pass and Honours were started in 1960-61 to which Botany and Zoology were added in 1972. Affiliation to Commerce stream (Pre-University Level) was made in 1965. To this first year degree in commerce was added in 1966 and B.Com. (Pass) in 1967. Honours in Commerce was introduced in 1974-75. Provision of Post Graduate Teaching in Commerce and History started from 1979-80 and 1983-84 respectively. Post Graduate teaching in Economics, Philosophy and Chemistry started during the session 1990-91. Post Graduate teaching in Physics, Political Science and Oriya commenced from 1992-93. Subsequently Post Graduate teaching was also introduced in Zoology, Botany and English. New subjects like Statistics, Geography, Geology, Sociology, Secretarial Practice and Photography were started between 1981-83. Geography as optional subject was introduced at +3 Level in 1992-93. Sociology was introduced in the next session. Several vocational subjects were introduced in 1994-95. These are (a) Sericulture for +3 Science, (b) Communicative English for +3 Arts and (c) Office Management and Secretarial Practice for +3 Commerce. This continual opening of course offerings has enticed many students even outside the State.

When Utkal University was divided into three Universities, the North Orissa University was established in 1999. M.P.C. College was affiliated to North Orissa University in July 1999. All the examinations were conducted by the North Orissa University for the session 1999-2000 and 2000-2001. M.P.C. College was declared Autonomous by the UGC, New Delhi in 1999-2000. However real academic autonomy was conferred upon the college during 2001-2602 with

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an independent Entrance Examination based on selection procedure, independent courses of study and independent examination procedure for +3 lst Year students and Vth Year PG students. M.P.C. Autonomous College was shifted from the Old Maharaja Palace to its new college campus at Takhatpur during 2001 summer. The college started functioning in the new campus from 8th June 2001. According to the directives of the Department of Higher Education, Govt. of Odisha, M.P.C. Morning College merged with M.P.C. Autonomous College. By the order of Department of Higher Education five PG Departments viz, Botany, Chemistry, Economics, Physics and Zoology were shifted to North Orissa University during July 2004 and consequently Autonomy status has been truncated. In exchange the Higher Education Department, govt. of Orissa had approved opening of four Self-financing courses viz., Bio-Chemistry, Industrial Chemistry, Environmental Economics and Microbiology from the session 2005-0% opening of MBA as SFC under PG Dept. of Commerce is subject to approval of AlCTE. Out of four approved SFCs Microbiology under Botany Department & Industrial Chemistry under Chemistry Department have been functioning. Other Three SFC subjects could not function due to non-response by the students and reluctance to pay higher fees in SFC without placement quarantee.

However, SFC such as B. Sc. Computer Science (Honours) and B.Com. e- Commerce (Honours) have been functioning in this college since 1998-99 and 2004-05 sessions respectively. Both the SFCs have 32 seats each per admission batch. Besides five Honours subjects such as Geology, Geography, Hindi, Sociology and Statistics being approved by Higher education Department, Government of Odisha from the academic session 2009-10 have been opened in this college to cater the persistent demand of the students. At present six regular PG Departments viz., Commerce, History, English, Odia, Political Science and Philosophy are imparting teaching to post graduate students.

The curricula of undergraduate and postgraduate classes are in conformity with those provided by the UGC. Eight papers for Honours and 10 Papers for PG students have been prescribed with a view to widening the intellectual horizon of the students and giving them scope to keep abreast of the recent developments in diverse fields. "Environmental Studies" as compulsory subject has been introduced for all the streams at Degree level. 60 Seated M.B.A. and M.C.A. have been approved by AICTE since 2011-12 and enrollment has been made in MCA during 2013-14. Education Honours and Elective have been opened during 2013-14 with approval of Higher Education Department. Proposal for Anthropology and Psychology (Honours and Electives) has been sent to Higher Education Department for approval during 2013-14. Proposal for BBA (SFC) has been sent to Higher Education Department for approval during 2013-14.

FACILITIES IN THE COLLEGE CAMPUS

The College has Staff Common Room, Boy's Common Room, Girl's Common Room, Library with adequate space and separate Reading Room. Automation of the Library has been started. About 1.11 lakh books are available in the College Library. Out of which, data of more than 78,000 books have been entered in the database with bar coding. National Service Scheme (NSS), Youth Red Cross (YRC) units are active. Network Resource Centre (NRC), Vehicle Stand, Co-operative Store, Play Ground is also available in the College Campus. The Canteen of the College is run in hygienic conditions.

The ATM facility is available in the College Campus and a branch of Odisha Gramya Bank has also been open in the College campus.

The Boy's Hostel with a capacity of 80 beds , Women's Hostel with a capacity of 120 beds and Tribal Hostel of 40 beds are functioning in the campus with full capacity. Besides, another Women's Hostel with 200 beds has also been constructed specifically for Tribal Girl students and is functioning. Another proposal for construction of 200 seated Tribal Hostel has been approved by the SC/ST Development Department of the State Govt. Construction is yet to be started. Adequate drinking water facilities have been provided by installing 10 Aqua-Guards with Cooler.

Science Laboratories with modern equipments, Computers, Smart Boards, LCD, Over head Projectors, LCD Projectors are available.

ANTI-RAGGING CELL

As per the directives of the Hon'ble Supreme Court and as per the instruction of the University Grants Commission as well as The Department of Higher Education, Government of Odisha, an Anti-Ragging Cell is functioning in the College. The Cell is headed by a senior teacher and supported by 07 other teachers of the College to maintain discipline and prohibit ragging in the campus. Till date, not a single case of ragging has been reported since its inception.

NATIONAL CADET CORPS (NCC):

Two NCC units, one for the boys and the other for the girls are functioning in the college with 50 cadets. The cadets not only attend different National Camps, but also help the district administration in maintaining discipline and rendering service during different festivals and during calamities. This year, 05 cadets were successful in Certificate 'B' Examination and 03 Cadets were successful in Certificate 'C' Examination. The college NCC Platform got first prize on Independence Day and Republic Day ceremonial parades. 05 Cadets attended All India Trekking Camp organized in Uttarakhand. One cadet represented Odisha and attended Republic Day Camp, 2013 at New Delhi.

FEE STRUCTURE:

The Fee structure of the College is as per the norms of the State Govt. The details are attached as Annexure-VII

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OBSERVATIONS & SUGGESTIONS OF THE COMMITTEE

OBSERVATIONS:

The courses offered by the College are periodically reviewed, revised and updated to 1. cater the need of the Society. The Curriculum is also as per UGC Model Curriculum almost in all the subjects.

A large number of students of the College could get admission in reputed premier 2. institutions like NIT, IIT, NISER, IISER, Pune for their research and PG Degrees which illustrate that courses offered by the College and method of teaching are good and the teachers are of high quality.

3 The students are also motivated to practice self learning with e-resources available in the Departments. They are encouraged to make several presentations as a part of their

internal assessment.

4 The provision of project work at the degree level is very good and it helps them to be innovative and creative in their discipline.

5. The efforts made by the College inculcating communicative skill in English is highly appreciable particularly keeping in view that most of the students come from backward areas of the district and nearby areas.

- 6. The Library of the College consists of a large number of books and journals on all subjects being taught in the College. It has a large covered area with adequate facility of Reading Room. Besides, more than 78,000 books (out of 1,11,000) have been entered in the Data Base of the Library with bar coding as a part of automation of the Library in order to make e-access to the students and teachers.
- 7. The College has sufficient class rooms with other infrastructure like laboratories, Parking Space. About 25000 plants have been planted in the College campus to make it eco-
- 8. The College has Hostel facilities separately for girls and boys both with mess facility. A separate Hotel has been constructed with 200 beds to cater the need of Girls from ST
- 9. About 33% of students from all categories are getting various scholarships from the Stat/Central Government funds.
- 10. The students are groomed by the faculties to pursue their higher studies in reputed
- The students are encouraged to participate in various inter College sports competitions 11. and have won several Championship awards almost every year.
- 12. The NSS, NCC, Youth Red Cross (YRC) are active in the College and the students are actively engaged in social work like blood donation, traffic management, service in festive seasons as well as natural calamities. They also organize several awareness camps to sensitize people against issues like Aids, Tobacco Consumption and other injurious habits.
- 13. One of the faculties viz. Dr. (Mrs.) Damayanti Beshra has been awarded with SAHITYA ACADAMY AWARD for her contribution to Santhali language.

SUGGESTIONS:

- Serious steps need to be taken to fill up the vacant posts in the College in teaching and noni) teaching both.
- The Committee feels that more Guest Faculties possessing UGC prescribed qualifications should ii) be engaged to avoid interruption in flow of teaching. The remunerations should, however, be as per UGC norms.
- There is a need of more Women's Hostel in the College as close to more than 2/3rd of the iii) enrolment consists of girls.
- Amenities like cycle stand and reading room etc. need to be improved. The College authorities iv) should take up with the State Government to ensure that the students should not pay electricity charges at commercial rates.

V) The College Library should be connected with INFLIBNET and other such agencies so that the students and teachers may have access to the information/data procured with such agencies.

14. RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE COMMITTEE

Keeping in view of the good performance of teachers in imparting education in excellent manners and students in securing admission in reputed institutions in the country after passing from the College and also in maintaining commendable academic as well as moral standards the Committee unanimously recommends that the College may be given ex-post facto extension of autonomous status for a period of two years i.e. 2011-12 to 2012-13.

The Committee further recommends for conferment of extension of autonomous status to the College for a period of six years i.e. w.e.f. 2013-14 to 2018-2019
